Welcome to the fifth annual F-O-R-M (Festival of Recorded Movement)! In 2015, F-O-R-M became Vancouver's first ever youth-focused movement on screen festival, and 2020 marks our first ever all-digital festival.

F-O-R-M was founded by dance artist Sophia Wolfe, with the support of Company 605 and Kristina Lemieux. F-O-R-M grew out of a desire for a platform in the city dedicated to young and emerging artists to create and share films that center around the body in motion. Since the festival's inception, we have continued to support youth and emerging artists through opportunities to learn and gain experience in the filmmaking process, while building a community of creators to share and present their work.

F-O-R-M engages audiences with films that inspire them to see movement from new perspectives. All of the films you will see over the course of the festival are made by artists in the very early stages of their creative endeavours and/or brand new to the process of making movement-based films. For some, this is the very first film they have ever created and for others, the first time it has been screened in a film festival context! By combining youth and emerging artists throughout our programming, we see an opportunity for each generation to inspire and learn from one another, spark conversation, expand networks, and build community.

We are excited to present a variety of films that deliver strong imagery of the human body in motion, explore the limitlessness of our physical capacity, and offer a sense of choreographic investigation between camera and movement. Our curatorial programming focuses on films that showcase unique and important stories of young individuals told through the power of movement and film. Our full week of screenings features films from local, national, and international artists, including filmmakers from Japan, Mexico, the United Kingdom, and more!



BLUSCRN is a collection of multimedia dance works exploring the impacts and imprints of flat media and hyper marketing onto the contemporary body. By using both live and post-production chroma keying softwares to filter and replace environments, objects, and clothing, the project asserts a simultaneous operation of the body as subject and object.

In translating physical space to a 2-dimensional screen, the artists examine the techniques of live performance, popular media, and cinema; all of which have their own concepts of image and ideation. These frameworks of imagination and immersion serve as a context from which we can observe the constantly changing landscape of body politic and social marketing.

This iteration of BLUSCRN will manifest as 3 distinct short films: BLUrm, BLUbrd, and BLUprnt – each containing a central question of how bodies behave within and transform beyond specific environments.



To kick off the festival, we want to pass the movement on to *you*. FORMations will be 24 hours of virtual movement tag, where your phone becomes a space for spontaneity, collaboration, and community building to unfold.

Join us on Instagram, where we'll start the chain on IG stories and tag two accounts to continue the movement chain. Wait until you're tagged or pick up the movement and start your own chain at any time - just remember to tag @formvancouver #FORMations2020 and two friends to keep it going! 
### **Artist Talks**

### Sarah Friedland (NYC): Choreographing the Social

THURS SEPT 17, 11AM PST

"Focusing on the processes of making my last three works - *Drills*, *CROWDS*, and *Home Exercises* - this artist talk will explore the methods of choreographic research and filmic performance at play in my hybrid filmmaking. Working in between dance, fiction, and non-fiction filmmaking, I stage and script bodies and cameras in concert with one another to elucidate and distill the undetected, embodied mechanics of social life and the body politic."

"Facilitating a research process integrating movements, gestures, and postures from cinema and archival footage, embodied memories, and contemporary dance languages, I choreograph through practices of interviewing, re- and pre-enactment, adaptation, and improvisational play, shaping dances with diverse communities of performers and movers — from professional dancers to cohorts of seniors and teenagers. This talk will consider and break down the way in which I bring these choreographic and filmic practices into contact with one another."

Drawing from Sasha's practice as a composer and interdisciplinary performer, this workshop aims to provide participants with reflective tools to use when composing and selecting music for dance, performance, and moving images. Through participatory exercises and group discussion, we will practice identifying specific sound qualities that can be useful to observe when pairing sound with movement, and look at how to translate abstract feelings or descriptive words into concrete musical ideas. Participants are welcome to bring ideas-in-progress to the discussion.

### **Exploratory Hour with Simran Sachar**

SAT SEPT 19, 3PM PST

A physical and imaginative dance-based, creative, thorough self exploration. Pertaining to your own authentic movement and honouring where you are, and what you have, no matter what your dance background is. No labels. This class is a creative/freestyle based class. From a dreamy state to puzzling tasks, Sim will have you shedding old layers and breaking all the rules you thought existed.

### The Mystery of Now

Vancouver Premiere

Audrey Buchanan (USA)

In the short film, The Mystery of Now, artist and Apache Skateboards founder, Douglas Miles shares socio-political context around the history that led to life on the San Carlos Apache reservation, and the personal history of how and why he started a skateboard brand and team of local youth leaders. His advice on cultivating resilience, creativity, and joy, provides guidance in a time that for many feels uncertain, polarizing and divisive in our living rooms and around our dinner tables.

"It's no mystery that the history of Native American people in this country has been overlooked, misrepresented and maligned to create a more heroic narrative for settlers to sell books, to sell land, and to sell movie tickets," Douglas shares. "In the middle of this cultural clash, stereotypes and battles for agency, one thing that has never ceased is Native creativity and the making of art. In our creativity we recreate ourselves, and in doing so we create and shape the world around us."

In his words, "this film is visual meditation about life on the Apache nation via lived experience of Apache Skateboards. It's a soulfully joyous glimpse into hard-edged lives of Native kids becoming artists, musicians, skaters, creatives, and leading in their community using art, music and skateboarding as a means of expression and power."

The story follows our protagonist as they navigate isolation and seek a sense of belonging in a conflicting and new environment. Drawing on themes of double consciousness and experimental embodiment, this story explores the relationship between Blackness and the environment

in which this concept exists. Drawing from community dialogue to address the filmmakers' own subjective relationship to public space as mixed race Black identifying people, this film intends to hold space for diverse experiences of Blackness in so called "Vancouver". In times where racial politics exist in every crevice of society, the filmmakers escape temporal confines by decolonizing our situated experience, delving into the untold past, dreamy memories and future imaginings.
